
ST. MARY'S CHURCH

Join us Sunday, March 13, 2011 at 2 PM for the story of the Roman Catholic parish here in Clinton. Rev. John Croghan will present the program and is keenly qualified to do so.

After schooling in Utica at St. Francis de Sales and Notre Dame he studied for the priesthood at Wadhams Hall Seminary in Ogdensburg and St. Bernard's Seminary in Rochester.

He first came to Clinton in 1982 as Catholic Chaplain at Hamilton College and Associate at St. Mary's. Leaving in 1988 for MVCC Father Croghan returned in 1996 as Administrator of St. Mary's and was made Pastor in 2008 making him eminently capable of informing us about the parish which can be traced back to November 21,1850 when Rev. William C. Coghlan was appointed the first pastor.

CLINTON GIRL WED BY KU KLUX KLAN

Unusual interest was attached to the filing of a wedding license with Francis J. Burns, Kirkland town clerk, about a wedding at a meeting of the Ku Klux Klan north of Utica on Newport Road.

The certificate filed by Rev. K. Jeffries Whaley, Watertown said that Gertrude Angeline Helmer, age 17, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Sewell

Helmer of Franklin Avenue, became the bride of John Arnold, age 26, of New York Mills. The place of the marriage was given as "Eugene Weeks Farm, East Schuyler."

The Klan ceremony was performed on a platform in a lot just off Newport Road. The organist and male quintet. as well as Mr. Whaley and the bridal party

were all dressed in Klan regalia. The Methodist ring ceremony was used.

So far as we know Miss Helmer has the distinction of being the first from this neighborhood to be united in marriage through the auspices of the Ku Klux Klan.

All help will be greatly appreciated.


Return survey form with your dues.

The Clinton Knitting Mill is shown above in the 1930s or early 1940s. This is a view east from Kirkland Avenue across from the Clinton Agway. Parallel to the building were the tracks of the NYO&W railroad. Note the high wheeled

baggage cart at right. The tracks were between the cart and the mill covered with snow in this picture.

After the mill closed in 1951 this was a lumber yard and later a Genuine Auto Parts Shop. It was torn down around 1970 to make way for the

construction of the Clinton House Apartments which now occupy that entire site.

The former freight station of the NYO&W is now the garage annex for the residents. It was moved several yards east to its current location.

CLINTON HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Society has been located at 1 Fountain Street since early 1994 when trustees of the Clinton Baptist Church turned over the property. The building was in poor shape but was used to store the Society's collection of Kirkland and Clinton history (artifacts, documents, pictures, etc.) which previously were at the Kirkland Town Library.

In 1999 the Society began a fund drive and a complete renovation project to change from a church to an historical society.

That project was successfully accomplished, and the renovated church had a formal opening in July 2001.

This picture was taken by "Carpenter" of Clinton in 1893. Mrs. King wrote on the back of the photo that these Clinton girls formed a club called T.N.T. Mrs. King suspects that Julia Stebbins, Grace Hayes, and Caroline Owens were in it plus 3 unidentified gals.
