WOMEN ABOLITIONISTS IN ONEIDA COUNTY

Our next meeting on Thursday, October 9 will feature Lee resident Maryellen Urtz, who will discuss women of Oneida County connected to the "abolitionist movement" of the antebellum era.

Oneida County had a minority of abolitionists, but they formed anti-slavery societies and held meetings. Anti-slavery tracts, lectures, and petitions were part of their tactics to eradicate slavery.

Maryellen Urtz became hooked on history over 30 years ago when she served eight years as Town of Lee Historian. She has a degree from Russell Sage College with majors in history and social studies education. She has done much research in New York and neighboring states and has been a columnist in the monthly paper "Women in Motion" sharing some of her stories of little-known women in history.

Plan on attending October 9 to hear the story of women who led the fight here to end slavery. Refreshments will follow the meeting at the Society.

KIT HOMES

Several years ago our Newsletter editor Phil Munson did a few articles about Clinton homes which were built from kits sold by Sears and Roebuck. 4-5 Clinton homes are Sears homes.

This is an appeal now for any other homeowner to reveal if his/her home is a kit. Aladdin Homes, Montgomery Ward, and a few other firms also sold these kits between the 1880's and 1960's.

KITS continued

Numerous kits were constructed in villages and cities across the country in the first half of the 20th century. Costs of these homes ranged up to \$4-5000. Some firms also sold garage kits, camp kits, and addition kits.

They were advertised as something the owner could build in a few days.

KIRKLAND CEMETERIES

Brimfield Street



Beginning a series on cemeteries in Kirkland we first look at the one on Brimfield Street across from Cleary Road.

Clinton Courier owners James B. And Henry B. Sykes in 1896 printed an account of the Old Burying Ground and also the Brimfield Street burial ground in a pamphlet entitled *Historical Sketch of the Old Clinton Burying Ground*. Here's Sykes' description of the cemetery:

"This enclosure contains 17 rods and can be traced back to May 20, 1820 when Nathan Marsh leased the plot to Hannaniah Ellinwood, Nathaniel Butler, James Look, Jared Andrews, Moses Dickinson, Reuben Ellinwood, Simeon Robbins, John W. Carpenter, William Carpenter, Augustus Carpenter, Eli Ellinwood, Samuel Coe of Paris, and Charles Babcock of Whitestown in consideration of \$5.00 and two cents annual rental, payable May 1st if legally demanded." It is signed by Nathan Marsh, and the witnesses were Jeremiah Matthews and Adolphus Ellinwood.

In spring 1790 three families from Brimfield, Massachusetts arrived here in the then Town of Whitestown. Their names were Marsh, Carpenter, and Ellinwood. Their aim was to clear some land, plant it, and erect a log cabin by fall. They then returned to Massachusetts and came back here in November with their families, cattle, pigs, and household goods.

Nathan Marsh, William Carpenter, and Hannaniah Ellinwood were these sturdy pioneers who settled on Lot No. 81 of the 7th Division of Coxe's Patent in the area of Cleary Road and Brimfield Street. An eighteen room house replaced the original log cabin and is still in the family, now Burrows, at 8344 Brimfield Street.

Some of these men buried served in the Revolutionary War although records are somewhat unclear. Captains John Carpenter, James Look, and Lieutenant John W. Carpenter along with David Coe, Hananniah Ellinwood, Nathan Marsh, and Peleg Bill Pratt were soldiers of the Continental Army.


The Oneida Chapter of the D.A.R. held a dedication ceremony at the cemetery

in September 1929. Bronze markers with individual names were dedicated with short talks about each soldier given by people who were direct descendants of the soldiers.

The program contained a bugle assembly, call to order by Regent Mrs. F.F. Russell, invocation concluding with the Lord's Prayer, a reading, remarks about the six soldiers, placing of flags and flowers by descendants, flag salute, benediction, and taps bugle.

The Kirkland Highway Department has cared for this abandoned cemetery for years, and it is in good condition considering the age of some stones. Grass is mowed, and the plot is kept trimmed.

In September 2007 the Society marked several abandoned cemeteries in the town including Brimfield Street. The sign is below.



Between circa 1801 and 1880 about 45 burials were made here of people who lived in the area. The members of the Marsh, Ellinwood, and Carpenter families made up the majority of those interred, a fitting place to rest considering they pioneered or homesteaded here in the 1790s.
