

COMPLETING EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY

High school intern, Dan Martini, completed the long term project of the Clinton Historical Society in the lobby of the headquarters at 1 Fountain Street. In the Fall of 2008 the beautiful huge white oak tree in the parking lot left of Tony's Pizza (College St. between Marvin St. and Franklin Ave.) was cut down due to disease.

A committee of then Society President Frank Cittadino, Glen McGregor, and John Burdick arranged to secure a slab of the trunk for a display. With the generous help of Cresswell Brothers, Kirkland Town Highway Department, who perfected the cut of the slab, Larry Thompson of Clinton Hardwood Floors, who finished it with polyurethane and Dave Litz of Clinton Moving and Storage, who had it moved to our building, it was permanently mounted just inside the front door.


Some historical background—In approximately 1800 Revolutionary War veteran, Ozias Marvin, had his home erected at 34 College St. which still stands today as College Commons. His barn was across the road. He owned most of the land from his house to the Oriskany Creek at one time and up until he died he still owned 36 acres including today's Marvin Street property up well beyond the Chestnut Street homes.

In 1846, two years before his death in 1848, a tree began to sprout to the left of his barn. After Marvin's death Othniel S. Williams purchased the thirty-six acres and started developing Marvin Street. Our historic tree survived for 146 years in the front yard of original homeowner, Dr. Panette Hast-

ings, as well as Schilling's gas station and now Tony's.

The Society hopes the public, especially children, will study the labels in the rings to absorb the concept of local history.

CD POLICE ITEMS ACQUIRED

Society President Bob Tegart has been instrumental in acquiring several artifacts and items used by the Town of Kirkland Civilian Defense Auxiliary Police. With the cooperation of Town Supervisor Robert Meelan the items have been in the cellar of Lumbard Memorial Hall and had been unused since the late 1950s. and 1960s.

***Recall that during the 1950s and 1960s Civilian Defense by attack by nuclear weapons and/or the Russians was a major issue.

These items are being evaluated and accessioned and plans are for a display in the future.

SOME HISTORICAL SOCIETY BRIEFS

- 1. Former Society Director Wade Lallier has acquired a donation of an old wooden display case for the lower level. This will be filled with artifacts shortly and will enhance the exhibits in that area.
